The first one is Brockamin, Callow End, Worcester, on Sunday 6th February 11am - 4pm for snowdrops.

This is a plant specialist's 1½ acre informal working garden, parts of which are used for plant production rather than for show. Situated next to common land. Mixed borders with wide variety of hardy perennials where plants are allowed to self seed. Open for snowdrops in Feb, daffodils and pulmonarias in March and April. Teas with home-made cakes and unusual plants for sale.

Gardening Jobs for January, February & March

Pruning

• Prune Apple & Pear Trees, choose a dry day and remove dead, damaged or diseased branches, aim to create an open structure to allow air flow & sunlight in.

• Prune Climbing Roses during Winter, remove weak & diseased growth, tie in new, strong, healthy growth & shorten long shoots. Remove unproductive stems to the base

to encourage fresh new growth.

- When growth begins, prune Shrub Roses to create an open centre, cutting back to an outward facing bud. Dispose of fallen leaves to prevent Black Spot.
- In February cut back Group 3 Clematis to lowest pair of healthy buds.
- Prune Wisteria shoots back to 2 or 3 buds.
- Cut back Buddleja stems to a strong pair of healthy buds, on the old wood framework.
- When growth starts prune Dogwoods to a healthy, low pair of buds to encourage fresh stems.
- Cut down the remaining Herbaceous Perennials and compost.
- Remove leaves from Hellebores to show off flowers and keep Leaf Spot in check.
- Cut back Deciduous Ornamental Grasses in early to mid-Spring ready for the new growth to begin.

Sowing/Planting

- For an early crop of Sweet Peas, sow in deep pots and grow on in a cold frame.
- Towards the end of Feb/March start off Vegetable and Salad crops ready to plant out when weather allows.
- Start Dahlia Tubers into growth.



Plan your Bedding displays and think about filling any gaps in the planting schemes.

Give yourself a challenge and grow something you've never grown before.





Prevention

- Apply mulch to beds to smother any early weed growth.
- Look out for 'Beasties' such as Vine Weevils and treat Pots & Containers with Nematodes from March to May.
- Squish early colonies of Aphids, particularly on Rose buds.
- Look out for the first Lily Beetles as they emerge on warm days. Controlling these early can prevent the unsightly damage later.



Tidy

- Clear Ponds of debris.
- Remove or comb the dead foliage from Evergreen Ornamental Grasses.
- Clean Tools and prepare Pots & Trays for the new growing season.
